RH INJURY LUCK CONTINUES - BUT THE QUALITY IMPRESSES

Last month's 26th place in the National Vets road relays was a serious disappointment- but this is one of those rare occasions when it is fully justified to look at performance rather than overall result. Remember the prediction after last year's 15th spot? 1996 top ten, 1997 in the medals. I can see no reason to alter the latter part of this prediction. The top ten aim was based on the inclusion of Paul Venables and Chris Beighton, both in the event sidelined with injuries. Without them the very strong RH squad did all that was needed for a top ten place and but for the misfortune of Chris Lindley pulling a hamstring just 1k into the sixth stage, we had it made. In fact if Chris had been able to return a 16.30 time, which is well within his capability, we would have done even better.


As it was, he dropped over 4 minutes, but showed great courage and team spirit by finishing the stage at all - running 5k with a pulled hamstring is risky at best- but this at least gave Steve Gaines and Peter Morris the chance to pull us back into a respectable position.

The consistency of the Rotherham runners was remarkable, with all inside the 16 minute bracket and new boys John Atkinson and Peter Purdy slotted into the team smartly enough to belie their lack of relay experience.

Alan Gregory set us off competently as usual, well in the pack, and on four Dave Hindmarsh looked very sharp as he hammered through the field. A welcome return for Malc Palfreyman kept up the momentum and with three sharp runners to come all looked well. Chris of course was devastated, but it is one of those things that could happen any time to any runner. With a similar problem Sheffield could not complete the stage and were disqualified. We still came home in front of Barnsley and Hallamshire, but it let in the consistent Steel City squad. Results p 3



Runners, Races

First the good news- we have a date for the Damflask Relays. Then the bad news- it's on Thursday 25th July rather than its 'traditional' date. Hopefully the change of date will not mean a change of format also- but we will wait and see. Stainforth AC have announced that the proposed 10k (to replace the 10) will not take place, but happily they are intending to resurrect the Woodhouse 7 in December. Since that was always popular with our members, and since we need a few races to complete the club list, I have told Mick Hill that we will include it. The date is the last Sunday before Christmas, i.e. December 22nd.

Colleagues will be glad to hear that Darryl Bennett, who was injured in the closing stages of the Prince of Wales run, has made a good recovery. It is lucky that he was not far more seriously injured. His most serious hurt was to his elbow which he says is mending nicely. The problems which remain seem to the legacy of impacts to his knee and shoulder, which he has to work on. He has resumed running and trying (aren't we all!) not to do too much. He has even threatened to come to the Worsborugh road league.

Winning numbers for May (drawn at the social night last Wednesday) were £85 Alan Bryden no.295; £10 each for John Lynch no.198, Pete Adams no.1, and Bernie Gould no.206. 230 numbers sold. Thank you Brian.

Paul Venables, Chris Beighton, Andrew Aked all are making progress, Paul is lining up races again. I am making no progress at all from foot and back injuries, it is very frustrating. But up to date I have been consoled by going to races where there has been brilliant support from Rotherham runners all through the field. It makes all the effort worthwhile to see RHAC clearly top South Yorkshire club, in fact taken overall top Yorkshire club as well in my view notwithstanding Bingley's quality front end. And we are getting stronger!

A fine team win for the boys at the difficult Buxton High Peak Half Marathon (formerly Otter HM). Last year we did it with Chris Parkes; even more impressive this year to do it without through the efforts of John Comrie, Nigel Brookes, John Atkinson. I think there might have been one other- apologies if so.. Malc Rhodes and Graham Benton were there as usual.

Best scores from Woodhall Spa were Steve Elvidge (1.15) in 13th place, Peter Purdy

(1.16 third vet) and Andy Parkin well placed- times not yet to hand. About 10 RHAC attended. Hot day. Big race.

After a brilliant 10k win in 30.40 in the Student's Championships, Rob Holladay has lined up the steeplechase this weekend in response to the club's need. If you fancy an alternative to the telly football on Saturday, go along to Woodburn Road Sheffield to add your support to RHAC track and field team who are doing tremendously well in the British Athletic League, slightly surprisingly in view of the fact that the injury list we complain about has the same effect on them- maybe worse even. There again, if you fancy a trip to the seaside, the Northern League team are at Grimsby on Sunday.

Lee Collingwood, who ran a smart 10k at the northern championships last week, was in the no-man's land of fourth position. A tremendous performance, but aggravatingly close to the medals. He is running really well again, having taken the South Yorks silver with 31.39 at the Askern 10k last week. Good results too from Paul Bennett and Mick Thompson at the Notts championships.

Dave Tune was well pleased with his 14.19 in the Inter-Counties 5k last month and now intends to use the olympic trials to turn in a good time. He is also lining up a crack at the national clubs team 10-mile championship at Leyland later on open entry, three to count. Messrs Parkes, Collingwood, and Neal have been approached so far, but this is no closed shop.

Promising 10k form from Phil Roberts, at Saxilby, and Rob McCarthy, whose 34.14 at the Prince follows pb performance at the Salford 10k last month. Rob regularly carries our colours deep in the enemy territory of Manchester.


Mark Ruddleston is sufficiently recovered to have taken on the Hallam Chase last week, in the company of Bram Sprakes and last year's newcomers' winner Donna Unwin. We may miss Donna for a while, she is off to Israel for a while running "outward-bound" type courses. Mark set off near scratch and had no chance against the eventual winner, but is planning a return next year.

The injury to one of our own runners tends to focus the mind on road running problems; they are in fact far more wideranging. I cannot remember a time when more races were altered or cancelled. It has made the planning of a championship

series particularly difficult. Many races are now folding. Many are given dates in the SY advance fixture list only to be shifted or shelved as the date approaches. Reports say that the attitude of the police to road races is changing, though their response to the small number of (admittedly undemanding) events we have recently organised has been as usual courteous and helpful. But you don't need me to tell you just how ridiculous traffic voume and sometimes traffic behaviour has become. Moreover, observers say that the worst dangers seem to arise not in races but on club nights, when the onus is even more clearly on the runner to think safety. Take care.

I am keen to have your pb times and performances for reports in this briefing, no matter what they are or who you are. I cannot phone 750 members to get them; pass them on.

If you are resigning from your club, which we hope isn't RHAC, you should do so in writing and if you continue to compete you should join another club within 28 days. Both clubs have to inform Northern Counties. You should then run for your new club, declaring yourself a non-scorer until your suspension is complete. You cannot be 'unattached' once you have been a club member (despite the status of a wellknown local runner, for whom the rules are regularly overlooked). You can in fact join as many clubs as you like, and you can run for any one of them at any time, but you can only score for your first-claim club, which is your oldest membership.

As a result, Parkes leads the series by some six minutes from John Comrie (4th overall-vets Kerr and Morris scoring separately) and both intend to protect their positions in the remaining two events. Teamwise, RHAC lead Barnsley 210.34 to 213.59 with Stainforth third. Barring carelessness on our part, BAC cannot touch this lead. In the vets, Keith Davies did not turn out and Kerr's 14 second lead over Peter Morris was eroded by Peter's fine 26.30 to only 4 seconds. Alan Gregory (27.53) and John Atkinson (27.56) kept RHAC in front of Steel City, just, by 165.25 to 165.57 with Stainforth again third. Derrick Clarke won the over-60 race on the night but trails Beckett (HH) by 1.33 and may find it hard to overturn this.

In the Ladies race, Carol Wolstenholme (30.41 formerly Carol Wilde, HH) is running brilliantly especially as she is class O/45, and won the race from RH vets Hilary Garrison (31.25) and Julia Jennings (31.59) but with none of these having run at Dinnington, Joanna Roberts 32.53 fourth place, whilst not up to her sharp first race time, was enough to keep her well in the lead. With a turn-out like this, it is not surprising that RH are murdering the combined senior/vets team competition by 194.18 from Barnsley's 200.39. Gill Bunker, Jane Clarke, Janet Pike, and Rose Grimley also ran well on the night, Jane, Gill and Janet are second in their categories whilst Rose now leads the O/45s.

There are no high-value prizes in the road league, usually the individual ones are modest and last year there was nothing to show for the team results. The value to us as a club however is incalculable; local runners at other clubs, and possible new runners, see the results of our turn-out and support all down the field on the night and see the overall results of the road league more clearly than any more high-profile events. They see RHAC as a club worth joining. It's worth a million pounds.
